## From the Taos News, September 21, 2025

The historic site **Carson House & Museum**, where frontiersman Christopher "Kit" Carson lived in Taos, has been awarded \$750,000 in federal funding, Kit Carson House Inc. organization announced Friday (Aug. 29). The award requires a 100 percent match (of \$750,000) and will support the rehabilitation and preservation of one of New Mexico's most significant historic landmarks.

The National Park Service awarded the money through the Save America's Treasures Grant Program, administered by the agency's State, Tribal, Local, Plans and Grants division.

"This award is a tremendous honor and a testament to the national importance of the Carson House & Museum," board president Martin Jagers said in the release. "With these funds, we can ensure that this historic adobe home and museum will be preserved for future generations, while continuing to explore our complex history."

The Carson House, built in 1825, is a designated National Historic Landmark and a cornerstone of New Mexico cultural heritage. As the former home of frontiersman Kit Carson and his wife Maria Josefa Jaramillo, the adobe residence is a surviving example of early 19th-century architecture in Northern New Mexico. The museum preserves artifacts, documents and exhibits that examine Carson's life and the broader history of the Southwest.

The Save America's Treasures Grant Program was established by Congress in 1998 to preserve nationally significant historic properties and collections that convey the nation's heritage. Administered by the National Park Service in partnership with the Institute of Museum and Library Services, the National Endowment for the Humanities, and the National Endowment for the Arts, the program has awarded over \$300 million to more than 1,300 projects nationwide.

"This grant affirms the cultural and historic value of the Carson House," Jagers said. "We are deeply grateful for this support, and we look forward to working closely with the National Park Service and our community to carry out this critical preservation work."

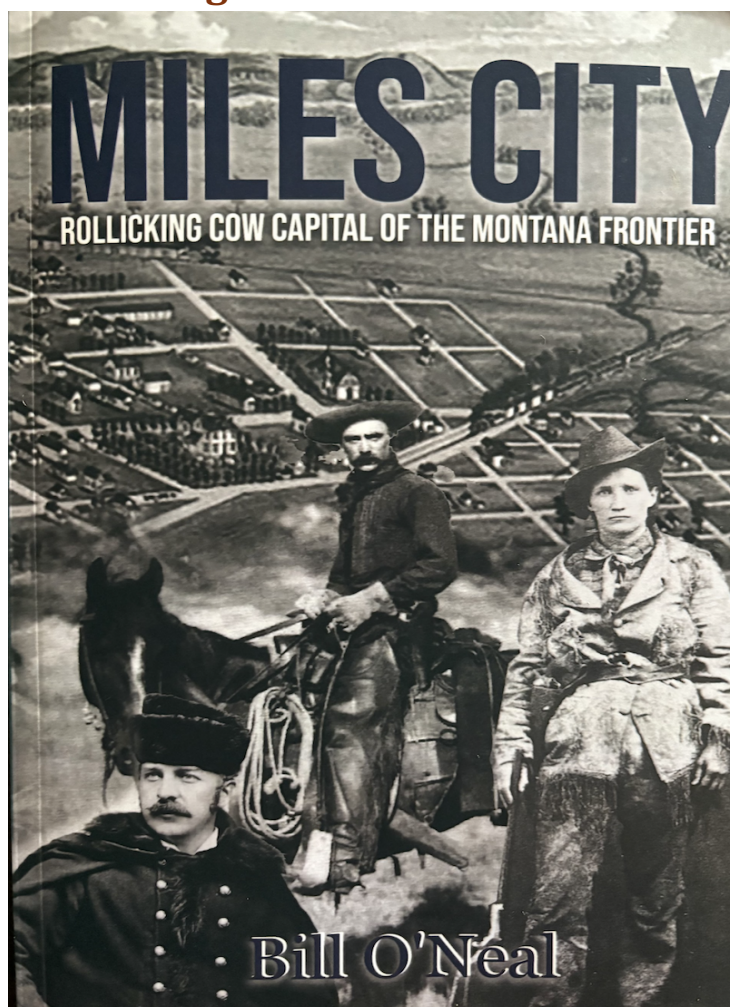


**Bill O'Neal's story about the making of his new book**  
**MILES CITY**  
**ROLICKING COW CAMP**  
**OF THE MONTANA**  
**FRONTIER**

I've just returned from 5 days in Miles City, Montana, promoting my new book, *Miles City, Rollicking Cow Capital of the Montana Frontier*. I first visited Miles City and its superb museum, The Range Riders Museum, in 1995, when Karon and I were working on the book that was published in 1997 by Eakin Press, *Historic Ranches of the Old West*. I never could get

this wonderful old town out of my mind, so two years ago I spent a week in Miles City with a bucket list of research sources and photos to acquire. Billy Huckaby of the Wild Horse Media Group, used to rodeo as a young man in Miles City, and he told me, "You write it and I'll publish it." I told Billy that I would go to Miles City for a PR visit. The book was released week before last and I flew to Montana to promote it. I was in Miles City the last day of August and the first four days of September. There was an evening program at the Range Riders Museum and one at the Public Library, which is the oldest Carnegie Library in Montana. I had a wonderful reunion with history friends I had made two years ago on my research trip. I placed the book in other museums and at the Miles City Saddlery, which has evolved into a magnificent Western Wear shop.

Miles City started as a recreation center for the 700 troopers of Fort Keogh, which was established in 1876 in the wake of the Custer Massacre. Gen. Nelson A. Miles led winter campaigns, while his soldiers let off steam in the saloons and parlor houses of nearby Miles City. There wasn't much gunplay, since the troopers could not take their firearms off the





fort premises, but there were drunken brawls EVERY night. And there were a few shootings, one lynching, and one throat cutting, enough to allow me to include a chapter on "Frontier Violence."

There were enough officers and officers wives to convert Fort Keogh into a "party fort," while Miles City became a "party town." With the arrival of a railroad in 1881 Miles City became an important cattle town (600,000 head of cattle were driven up from Texas within 3 years), and the Texas drovers brought the cowboy culture with them. Later the fort was converted to a remount station and Miles City became a horse town, and today a truly wild arena event, "The World Famous Miles City Bucking Horse Sale," doubles the size of the town each May.

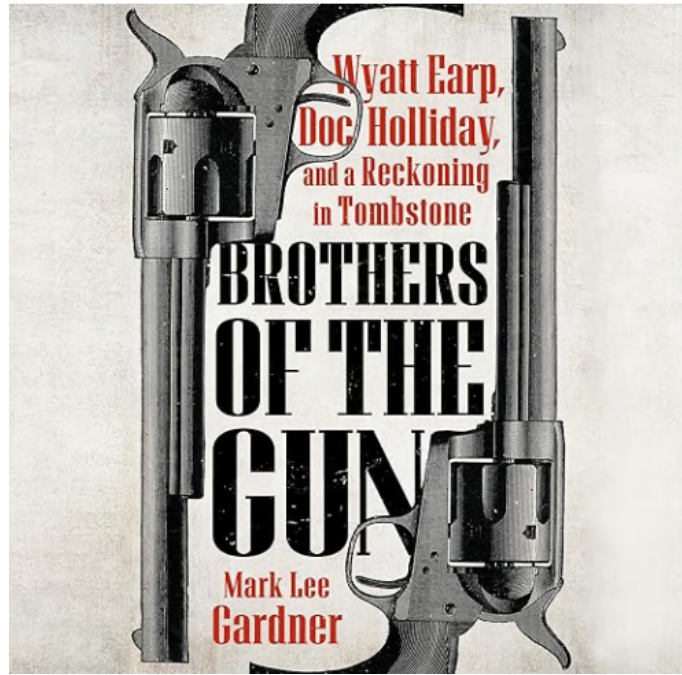
So I bought a Range Riders Museum cap, joined the Museum as a member, and wrote a long overdue book on this fascinating Western town. I would love to present a program on this wolf howl of a frontier community at the 2026 meeting of the WWHA.

**Brothers of the Gun: Wyatt Earp, Doc Holliday, and a Reckoning in Tombstone.**

The famous October 1881 gunfight at the O.K. Corral lasted for about thirty seconds. It was over almost before it had even started, and yet it, the town in which it took place (Tombstone), and some of its participants (marshal Wyatt Earp and his close friend Doc Holliday) have become legendary. In his new book, Gardner (*Shot All to Hell*, 2013) separates fact from historical fiction and presents the reader with these two men as they actually were. Based on seemingly exhaustive research into the historical record, the book shows us an Earp and Holliday we haven't seen before: not bigger-than-life legends, but real men who lived in a real, vividly-realized time period. They became friends when Doc saved Wyatt's life in Dodge City, and they traveled together, fought together, and gambled together. Their story in the years leading up to the brief shoot-out that catapulted them into legend is a Wild West saga as exciting as anything you'll read in the pages of a novel or see on-screen. A must-read for fans of the history of the American West.

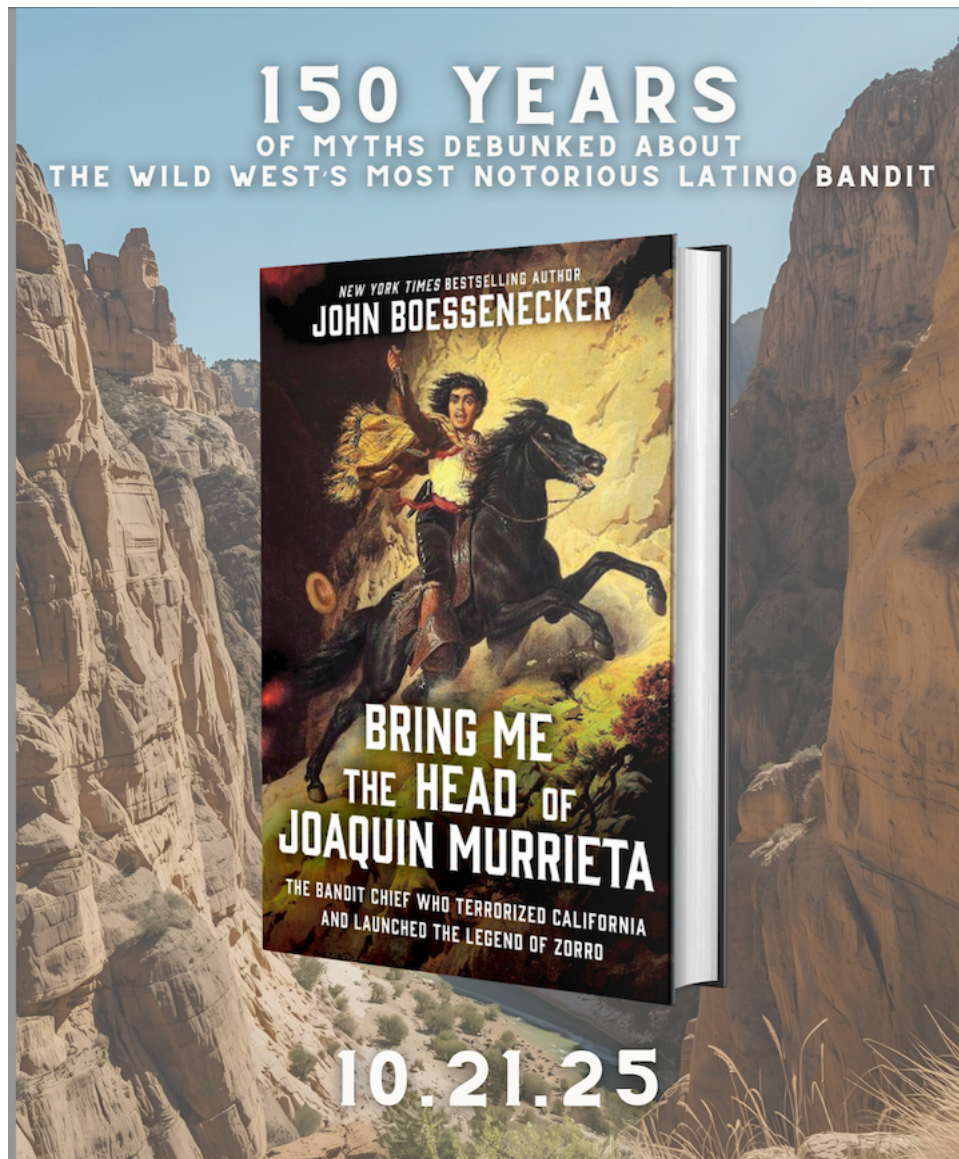
The audio book will be narrated by Western actor Bruce Boxleitner who has actually played Wyatt Earp.

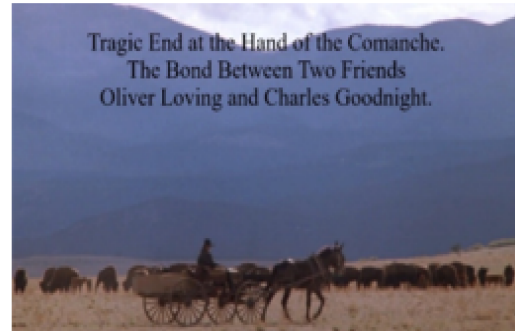

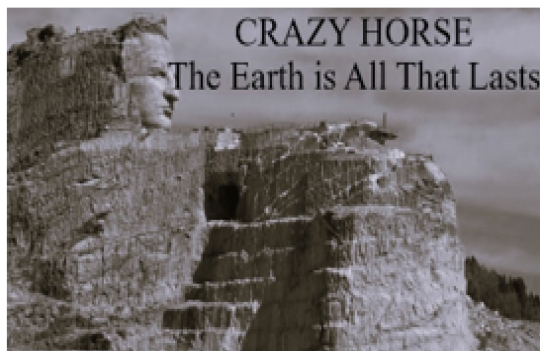
